

TODDLER SCARF

This project was originally posted to the BERNINA Sewing Republic site.

This scarf is soft and keeps your toddler warm in style. The length is just enough to make a single knot—not long enough to get caught in things. The knit fabric is good at staying put.

MATERIALS

- Two rectangles of sweater knit measuring 5" by 27"
- Coordinating thread
- Jersey-point needles
- One to three pieces of ribbon for the tag, each measuring 3" to 4"

STEPS

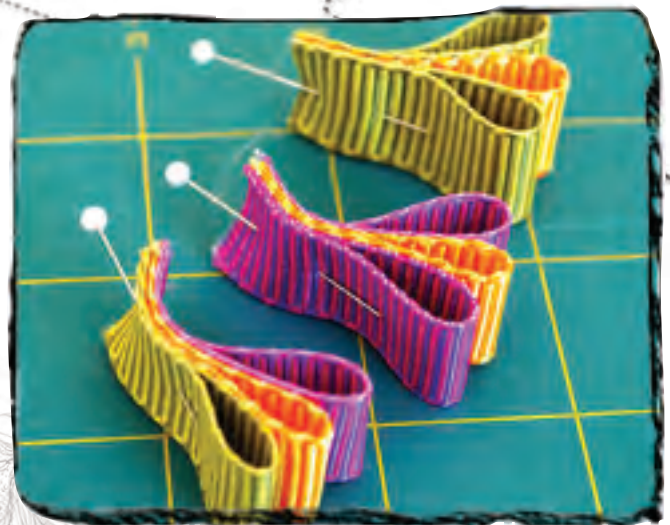
1. Cutting your material

Cut your materials to the specifications on the previous page: One to three pieces of ribbon, each measuring 3" to 4" and two rectangles of sweater knit measuring 5" by 27."



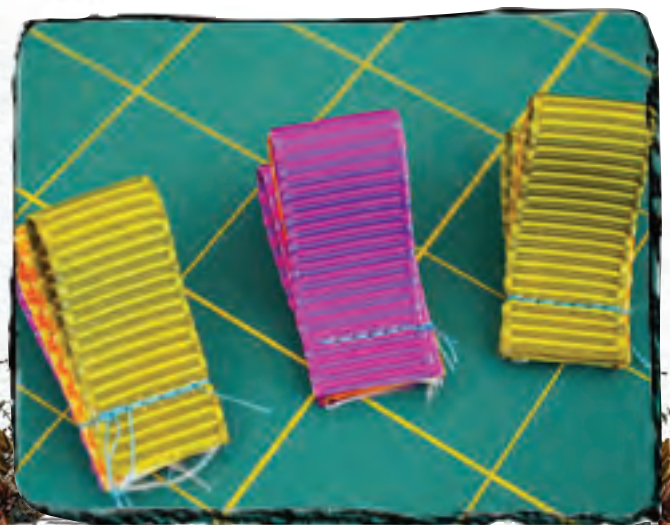
2. Prepare the ribbon tags

Fold the ribbon(s) in half and pin the raw edges together very securely. Ribbon shown in this photo is enough for three scarves.



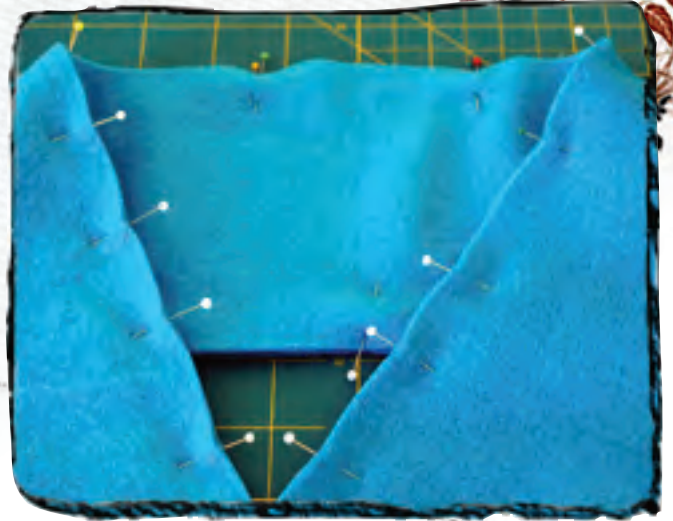
3. Sew 1/4" from the raw edges,

making sure the ribbons don't slip out of alignment.

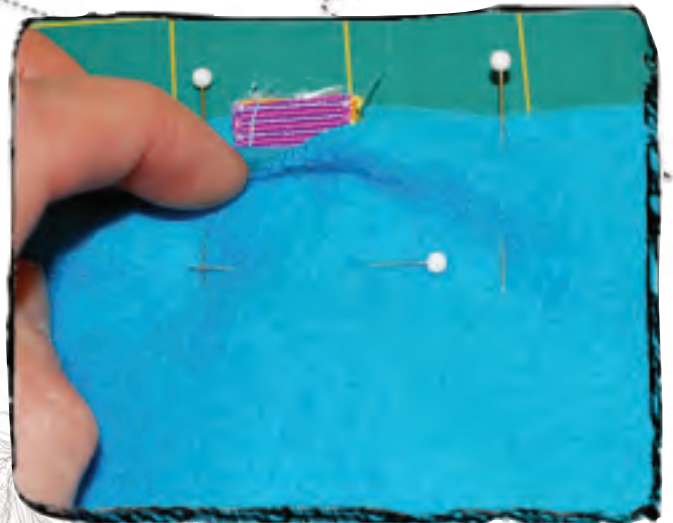


4. Pin the scarf

Pin the two scarf layers together with right sides facing each other, leaving an area about 3" long unpinned for turning later. I chose to place mine in the middle of one of the long sides.

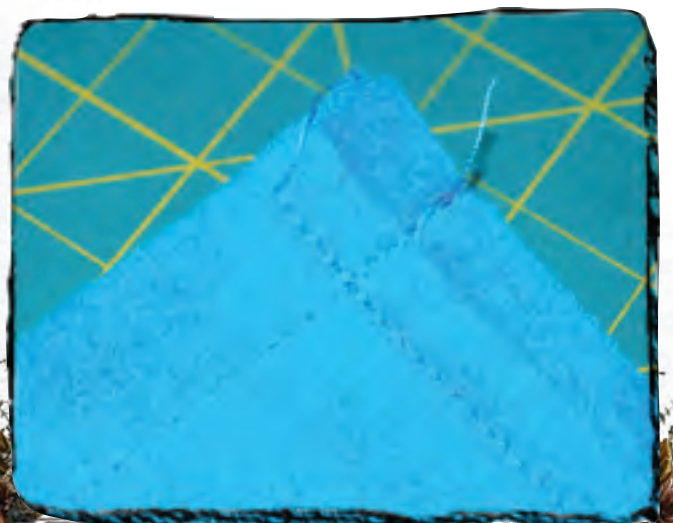


5. Insert the ribbon tag, aligning all the raw edges.

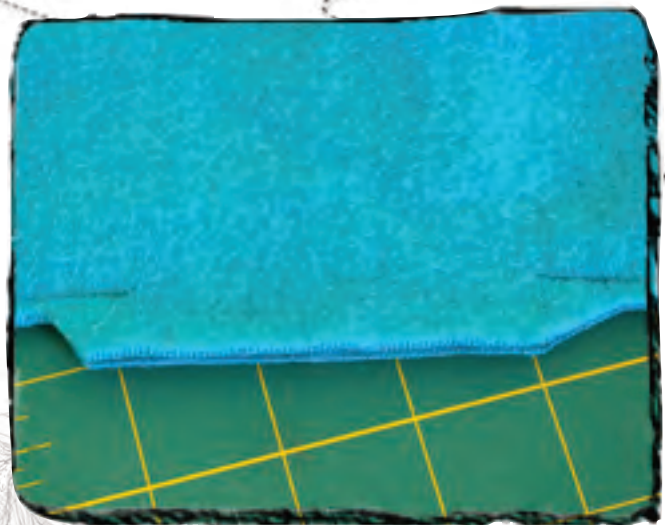
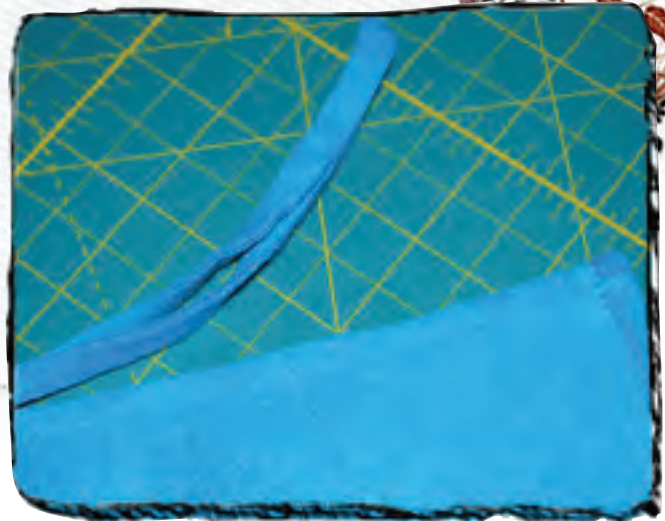


6. Sew

Sew all four edges of the scarf with a 1/2" seam allowance, catching the tag and leaving an opening for turning. Instead of pivoting at the corners, sew off the ends as shown in the photo.



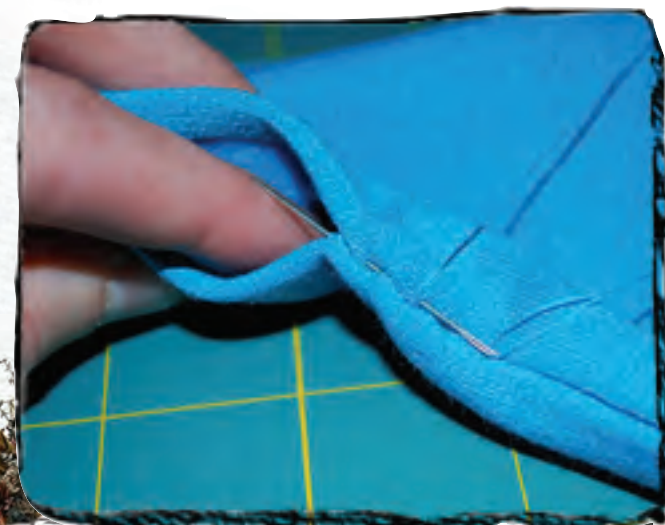
7. Trim the seam allowances to $\frac{1}{4}$ " but leave them intact around the turning hole.



8. Turn

Turn the scarf through the hole and press well. You can use a long knitting needle to help you turn the corners.

Sew the hole shut by hand.



9. Voila! You have completed this project so quickly you might want to make another.



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
